INCIDENTS AND HAPPENINGS

OUT OF OUR PAST

The Great Bell

High in our church tower steeple hangs the "Great Bell." For 160 years this bell has called the faithful to worship on Sunday, peeled joyously at weddings, marked 12 noon each day, and tolled at the funerals of both saints and sinners. This 1500-pound bell was cast by the Jones and Company Bell Foundry in Troy, New York in 1863. The plans for the "Second Church, " built in 1839, included a tower, and a possible bell. But it was not until 1862 and 1863 that serious fund-raising events, in the form of church fairs organized by the Ladies Aid Society, were held to finance a bell. Over \$500 was raised for the purchase. The church was proud to have this bell help proclaim the end of the Civil War in Stratford. The bell was rehung in the "Third Church," built in 1902. The "Fourth Church" was built in 1972, but the bell tower was not completed until 1976, so the bell spent several years on the front lawn. It was rehung with electronic controls so it can ring as programmed as well as manually.

The bell casting process has remained virtually unchanged since medieval times. The processes and techniques have been passed down over the years from master's to journeymen bell casters. Careful and deliberate measurements have to be taken for the desired bell size and tone.

MOLDING: The construction of the mold is the first step in bell casting. The mold is composed of an outer "cope" and the inner core. The mold is built of bricks and loam (a closely guarded secret mixture of clay, goat's hair, and horse manure). Both parts of the mold are smoothed and polished, then dried in an oven, coated with graphite, and clamped together. The empty space between the two parts is then filled with molten metal.

CASTING: The metal used in the casting is an alloy of 77% copper and 23% tin heated to 2140 degrees F in a huge furnace. The molten metal is poured from the furnace into a massive ladle, which is then brought to the mold on an overhead crane. The ladle is carefully tilted to pour the molten metal into the mold. After a day of cooling, the mold is broken open to reveal the bell.

CLEANING AND TUNING: After the mold loam has been removed, the surface cleaned and polished, the bell must be tuned in order to produce a pleasing tone when struck. Tuning takes place on a vertical boring mill that works like a potter's wheel. While spinning upside down on the mill, metal is cut from the bell's interior until the desired tone is achieved.

CLAPPER: The bell clapper is molded from wrought iron in a similar process as the bell, using a mold. The clapper is designed specifically for the bell at the proper weight, as a clapper that is too light will not bring out the true tones of the bell and a heavy clapper might cause the bell to crack. Holes are drilled into the top of the bell, and the clapper is attached to the inside of the bell either by a metal link or a leather strap.

Remember that there are many bells throughout the world—but our "Great Bell" in our church steeple tolls for you.
